#### B. Fundamentals regarding character and ethics

- 1. Christian character utterly impossible apart from the life of God within the believer since old man cannot be perfected or sanctified
- 2. Christian character entirely normal and possible—albeit uncommon—through the life of God within the believer because new man can be empowered and manifested

- 3. Christian character truly God's life in the saint: Philippians 1:21; Galatians 2:20; Colossians 3:4-a; every believer's potential that new life in Christ may be manifest, evident, visible
- 4. Understanding of word *Christian* in the phrase *Christian character*; *Christian* a word that appears only three times in the Word of God; a word naming a specific sub-group among saints / believers
  - a. Acts 26:28: persuasion: life with precious creed
  - b. Acts 11:26: pursuit: life of pious conduct
  - c. I Peter 4:16: persecution: life with possible / probable cost Being Christian (<u>adjective</u>) along with being a Christian (<u>noun</u>)
- 5. Christian character and ethics dependent upon Scripture:Philippians 1:7, 17, 27; 2:16, 22; 4:9
  - a. Living Word of God: John 6:63; Hebrews 4:12
  - b. Life-giving Word of God: John 5:24; I Peter 1:23
- Life from Scripture filling one's daily spiritual appetite
